This is a tool that you can use when at a party, in a club or a dorm. This was created to help you evaluate a situation that could end in sexual assault.

When you enter into a party, a club or a dorm, you assume the responsibility to look after one another, especially those who can't look out for themselves. You might be afraid to do something because of the negative consequences you may face, a friend being upset with you or even everyone at the party being upset. The consequences of not doing anything at all far outweigh the consequences of intervening. Sexual assault is not to be taken lightly; it is a serious offense that alters a person's life for the worst.
